## Lieutenant Colonel R. G. GROOM VD

[1876 - 1946]

Research has not uncovered a photograph of Colonel Groom

Colonel Groom was elected to Life Membership of the Club - between 1918 and 1928.

Colonel Groom was Honorary Secretary of the Club in 1905, and part-time Secretary of the Club 1936-42

Roy Graeme Groom was born on 12 December 1876 in Kyneton, Victoria. He was the younger son of Thomas Francis Groom [1840-1925], an agent, and Annie Hyacinthe Mary (née Wood) [1846-1918] – both from Launceston, Tasmania.

He had one older brother Thomas Clive Groom [1874-1953], an architect born in Kyneton who lived in North Queensland and Sydney and died in Brisbane.

The Groom family moved to Brisbane in 1891.

Roy Groom was a chartered accountant. In the early 1900s he formed the firm of R.G. Groom & Co. (initially in the T&G Building, Queen Street). The firm was active in most aspects of accounting – including insolvency and the audits of major entities such as the Brisbane City Council and the Metropolitan Water, Sewerage and Drainage Board. The firm became Groom, Sanderson & Co, and in the mid-1970s merged with the international firm of Peat Marwick Mitchell & Co. He was appointed a Justice of the Peace in 1910, and was a member of the council of the Chartered Accountants in Australia.

In 1904 he married May Augusta (née Bourne) [1878-1965] in Brisbane. They had six children:

December 1915 AIF Sea Transport Service

December 1915 OC Troops for voyage Brisbane to Suez on A55 HMAT *Kyarra*March 1916 OC Troops for voyage Suez to Melbourne on HMAT *Argyllshire* 

April 1916 Appointment terminated

May 1917 Awarded Auxiliary Forces Officers Decoration (VD)

Groom's promotion to Lieutenant Colonel has not been evidenced and it may have been a "retiring" honorary rank.

He was a keen bowler and was a Foundation and Life Member of the Auchenflower Bowling Club.

It is believed that Lieutenant Roy Groom joined the Club in 1898.

In June 1905 he is recorded as Honorary Secretary in a public notice applying for registration of the "Queensland United Service Institute" (as the Club was then known) under the new Registration of Clubs Act 1904. The Club was then situated at North Quay and had 104 members.

Lieutenant Colonel Groom was also part-time Secretary of the Club 1936-42. At its foundation, the Club relied on members to act as an Honorary Secretary. With the growth of the Club the first part-time Secretary was appointed in 1927. After Colonel Groom's retirement from office in 1942, the Club next appointed the first full-time Secretary.

Colonel Groom died suddenly in Brisbane on 27 February 1946.

DSO awarded for his gallantry in ending a massacre by Indonesians at the end of the war. Died flying an RAF jet fighter on exercise.
